

Prisoners of war (POWs) in the hundreds of thousands were taken by German and Italian forces during the Second World War. Most were captured in a string of defeats in France, and the Balkans between 1940 and 1942. They were held in a network of POW camps stretching from Nazi-occupied Poland to Italy.

How the Project / Website began: (Over 20 years ago)

Philip Baker became involved with the subject of Prisoners of War because of his friend Charles Saunders.

In 2001 Philip was working for Saga Holidays, a major British tour operator. The leader of the Broadstairs and St Peter's Concert band approached him because the band had the idea of performing a concert in Boulogne to say "thank you" to the citizens who had helped British soldiers, including Charles, during the war.

Unfortunately the band did not have enough money to pay for a trip to France, and they asked Philip whether his employers, Saga Holidays, would sponsor their proposed trip. Saga Holidays agreed

to do this and they appointed Philip as the organiser of the trip. The concert took place in Boulogne in

June 2001 and was a great success, and widely reported on French TV, radio and in the newspapers.

Reporting on our first year as a registered charity

Trustees are delighted to announce that the Online Memorial and Museum of Prisoners of War has doubled its number of weekly users following the launch of a new website.

Since becoming a registered charity in November 2022, the online resource has attracted a total of 5,800 users from around 40 different countries. It has also seen the addition of some 75,000 records sourced from The National Archives, with extensive work by two volunteers to correct errors in the data before uploading.

We have developed a new website and uploaded to it all the content from websites managed by the charity's founder, Philip Baker. This significant task was carried out entirely by volunteers. This marks a major milestone in delivering the charity's objective of providing a permanent, Online Memorial and Museum of Prisoners of War maintained and regularly updated as an interactive, historical and educational internet resource which enables the collection and preservation of information.

Between July and November 2023, the website doubled the number of users per week – from 250 to 519 – with around half coming from the UK. On average it attracted 42 users per day, hitting a peak of 150 users on Remembrance Sunday. Average engagement time is 5 minutes and the most viewed pages are STALAG VIIIB LAMSDORF / STALAG 344.

Whilst the majority of users come via Google search and Facebook referral, there are a large number of regular visitors who come direct to the site via the URL.

Highlights of 2023

- Appointed one new Trustee, Michael Sharratt, following the retirement of Philip Baker.
- Held 4 Trustee meetings.
- Opened a bank account with the Co-operative Bank and transferred the money donated by people who had paid to attend the POW75 commemorative event in 2020 which was cancelled as a result of Covid restrictions, and who did not seek a refund.

- Developed policies to support management of the charity and the volunteers who undertake work for it https://www.prisonersofwarmuseum.com/charity-policies/
- Met with representatives of the Friends of Stalag IVB association to explore synergies and invited them to provide a Trustee. As a result, Tony Drewitt joined the Trustees on 01.11.2023.
- Spoken to a Trustee of the Children and Families of the Far East Prisoners of War (<u>COFEPOW</u>) about the potential for some form of collaboration.
- One of our volunteers also compiled a new 55 page 'Help with Research' guide which was published on the website. <u>Use this link:</u>
- Met with the National Memorial Arboretum to discuss future maintenance, and possible replacement, of the existing memorial to all POWs which it hosts.

The Online Memorial and Museum of Prisoners of War is registered charity no 1200975.
